Big Ministerial Search News!

Dear AUUC Members,

When the Ministerial Search Committee (MSC)* undertook its task, they were hopeful to eventually find a Ministerial Candidate who would meet the expressed needs of our Community. After spending a weekend with the Reverend Jane Dwinell and listening to her preach in a neutral pulpit at the Plattsburgh UU Fellowship, the MSC agreed that this was a person who exemplifies the qualities and skills defined in our congregational survey.

On the weekend of May 3-4, Jane will come to Saranac Lake to be presented as the MSC's recommended candidate for the quarter-time ministerial position of the AUUC. She will be available on Saturday, May 3, to meet with Committee members , attend our rummage sale, and meet with the Board members. Jane will preach at the Sunday service on May 4. Following the service there will be a brief opportunity for your questions for Jane. After this, Jane will leave the room and a business meeting will be held, where a congregational vote will be conducted on calling the Rev. Jane Dwinell as our Minister.

It is critically important that you attend this service and participate in the decision to call this Minister for our congregation. A vote by the congregation to call a minister is not the same as hiring a minister. When the congregation calls a suitable candidate, a negotiation process begins and essential elements of the relationship, like job description, compensation, and limitations are negotiated. The candidate is hired, only if a mutually agreeable fit can be found. A Negotiating Committee has been chosen by the Ministerial Search Committee and is ready to begin the final step in the hiring process, if the congregational vote is affirmative. We are including biographical information, statements by individuals providing references, and information about where to review materials Jane has written online. Please let us know if you do not have internet access and we can make copies of some of her writings for you.

We hope you will review the Rev. Jane Dwinell's credentials and writings that are included in this letter carefully and take the opportunity to meet and speak with her the weekend of May 3/4. We hope your schedule will allow you to attend the service on May 4th and you will cast your vote for the candidate the MSC has chosen to present to you.

If you have any question or concerns, please contact one of the members of the Ministerial Search Committee.

I walk because my truck has been deemed uninspectable, too many things wrong to consider repair including a cracked frame.

I walk because I can, because I want to, because in my more noble heart I can take this opportunity to practice what I wish to preach. The Earth is suffering and I am part of the cause. Each time I drive a vehicle, each time I turn the thermostat up or play Spider on my computer I am affecting the destruction bit by bit of my home.

I have done what I can to make my home more energy efficient: new windows, a demand water heater, a pellet stove. I use only the lights I need where I sit reading or knitting or playing music. I know I can do more.

I walk downtown and have conversations with people on the street; a friend who is moving from the area. Another sweeping her driveway of the winter's road salt/sand. I tell her if I'd been in my truck I might have waved but never stopped to talk.

President's Letter

Greetings, All.

In a few weeks time we will be conducting our annual congregational meeting. The meeting will be held on May 18th, immediately after services. The business will include election of Trustees to the Board and passage of the 2015 Budget.

The board has spoken at some length about the timing of the annual meeting and passage of the budget, particularly with respect to our new fiscal year (switched not terribly long ago from a summer start to a normal calendar year) and in relation to our ministerial search. It may be that the annual meeting changes in the future, but for the time being, we're following our bylaws. If the budget needs to be tweaked sometime between May 18th and January 1st, we can do that. Either way, we'll be better off than we were this year, when we didn't pass the annual budget until well into the year it covered.

On a completely unrelated note, it saddens me to announce that one of our district staff members, Rev. Chris Nielson, has been diagnosed with Leukemia. Rev. Nielson assisted us in our search process. It was a first meeting with her for most, if not all of us, and we were looking forward to closer and more productive relations with the district. The following message from her provides the only details I know. Please hold Chris and her partner in your hearts.

Dear church leaders,

I want to inform you that I was just diagnosed with Acute Leukemia, and I will be starting treatment on Monday, April 28th. This is very intensive chemotherapy that will keep me out of work for several weeks, perhaps months. Rev. Joan Van Becelaere will be the primary contact in my absence, and will ask the regional and district staff to help as needed during this time. I know that many of you are in transition right now at your churches, and others will step in to help as needed, or reschedule to a time when I can return to work. There are many qualified people in the region who are great resources, and I will be back to work as soon as possible! As my treatment progresses, I'll keep our district board up to date. You will be in my thoughts.


